I often hear that it is difficult to fit education into a lodge schedule, especially if the lodge has a lot of degree work to do. There is a demonstrated need and demand for more educational activity. Survey after survey, in many jurisdictions show this. ### Reflections from the Master's Chair: W. Bro. Wladyslaw Kinastowski, W.M., St Andrews lodge 560

#### Brethren

Our lodge held a Lodge of Discussion last month. A brother asked why we don't have more open discussions during regular meetings on aspects of the ritual. Such a discussion can foster education and learning among members about the Craft. I've learned this year that it's difficult to fit in an interactive discussion after a degree, especially when brethren wish to experience some fellowship and get home at a reasonable hour.

That being said there are many ways to provide Masonic education. The first place to start is the library in the lodge building where there are many books available on Masonry. Masonic books can also be found in the public library, but also in the private libraries of the District, the Ottawa Masonic Centre and among the brethren in the Lodge. The web is also a great storehouse of e-books which are out of copyright, and available for download. E-Newsletters are now available from the Grand Lodge website, District and from the Grand Lodge Committee on Education. It's also a good idea to look at the websites of other Grand Lodges (try Nova Scotia, BC & Yukon, Pennsylvania or Massachusetts). If you're interested, or don't know where to start, ask a brother. I am sure you will get some good recommended

readings. There is also the College of Freemasonry that offers correspondence courses. Your lodge summons is also a source of information.

However, if you are looking for more interactive forms of education, formal and informal gatherings may be the way to go. Dedicated meetings, such as our recent emergent, that discuss a theme are one avenue. Another is to have a short presentation on a specific topic within a degree, which is given following the degree. While the presentation provides a brother's point of view, it can serve as a catalyst for further discussion and/or research by brethren after the lodge meeting. Another is visiting other lodges, especially on DD Nights. The DD always provides an insight into a different aspect of Masonry, and his lectures can serve as a focal point for further reflection/discussion. Attending a Study Circle that meets quarterly, and which mixes fellowship with education, is yet another option. If your lodge or district doesn't have one why not start one? It's not difficult.

In short, there are options available to brethren who wish to further their Masonic knowledge. All any one of us has to do is show interest, and many brethren will available to support you.

#### Conference on Masonic Education, Ottawa, June 2, 2012

Planning for this conference is well advanced. We have not yet finalized the keynote and dinner speakers but they will be well worth hearing. The day is for MASONS ONLY but if we get sufficient interest a ladies' program will be arranged. The format will be an initial plenary with a distinguished Masonic speaker, eight morning seminars each repeated once (participants will chose 4) and a wrap up plenary with conclusions from each group. There will be a non-Masonic speaker at the dinner following our last session. It is expected that the event will be over in time for personal activities with family if present.
